also installed a paver patio and koi pond at his personal residences. Dana is stepping away from his veterinary practice to devote time to his horse farm in Wendell.


Mark Easley moved here 8 years ago from California and

Did you know our very first customer was **Kim Randolph**? We installed landscaping and irrigation for her and her husband in September, 1993, for a little more than \$5,000. This was way before there were employees and Paul Martin worked alone. It took two weeks to install and only cost \$5,000. We're also happy to report that Kim was a repeat customer this year with the installation of a paver patio, fence, deck modifications and landscaping at her new Cary home. This time Carlos did the work and the project was \$18,000. Times have changed...



Q My lawn looks worse than ever. What can I do about it?

A Now is the time to decide. First you need to determine what you expect from a lawn. Then we

can determine what kind is best for you. If you want your lawn to be green through the winter, then your options are **cool season** grasses. Of these, the tall fescue varieties are most commonly used. The disadvantage to this type of lawn is that it looks its worst this time of year (this is probably what you have) and has a relatively high maintenance cost for mowing, watering and fertilizing. If a green lawn in winter is not important to you, then go with a **warm season** lawn. These include Bermuda, centipede, St. Augustine and zoysia. These lawns perform best in the summer and are roughly half the cost to maintain. The disadvantage is that they tend to be invasive into plant beds (particularly Bermuda) so you have to be vigilant in maintaining your bed edges.

Regardless of the choice, now is the time to prepare. Apply round-up on all your weeds and unwanted grass. Allow 8-11 days for it to take effect and reapply if necessary. Wait another 8 days. Cultivate the ground by raking or tilling. For fescue, you may use seed. Cast it by hand or drop spreader (not rotary) and cover with wheat straw. Water as frequently as you can. In 14 days it will germinate and will be mowable in another two weeks. For the warm season lawns, use sod (it is too late to attempt seed). Again water as frequently as you can but especially when you first lay it in. For more infor-

Grubs in your lawn?

THE GRUB-DAMAGED LAWN

Severe grub damage in a lawn appears as large, irregular sections of brown turf that detach from the soil without effort. Unlike turf damaged by drought or excessive fertilizer, the turf peels away like a carpet being rolled up.

For most of the year, however, grubs are out of sight and out of mind. They feed on grass roots in

your lawn and are usually noticed only when dead and damaged areas appear. Another indicator is Japanese Beetle presence on your ornamental shrubs and trees. They have now died but their grubs are eating your grass roots.

Seek out grubs in mid-August . Sampling early in a grub's life cycle means that you'll catch grubs while they are small and less capable of seriously damaging your lawn. Early sampling, ("scouting") while your lawn looks healthy increases your chances of being effective and decreases the possibility that moles and other animals will tunnel your lawn, feeding on grubs.

SAMPLING

Using a garden shovel or spade, cut three sides of a 12-inch square. Grab hold of the open edges and peel back the turf like a carpet, towards the attached side. Look for c-shaped grubs on the newly exposed soil and under the sod mat. Count them and make a note on your map. Replace the sod, water thoroughly, then move to your next sampling site. If you average 10 or more, it's time for treatment.

TREATMENT

For Japanese Beetle grubs, you can apply a biological like Milky Spore.
A more universal control is "Merit".
